Building Literacy Skills at Home

Literacy based activities should be encouraged at home during middle and high school years. Strong literacy skills are essential for development, provide a foundation for school and work, social skills, and solving problems. Below are a few strategies you can do at home with your middle and high schooler.

1. **Start a Family Book Club.** Read a book as a family and engage in discussions around the story.
2. **Listen to Audio Books.** Listening to a novel as a whole family is a great way to engage in family book discussions.
3. **Promote Choice.** Allowing your child to choose books they want to read can help foster a love of reading.
4. **Mix in Movies.** Suggest books from movies your child likes. They may enjoy getting the additional details that the book provides. Discuss how the book and movie are different. Compare how the movie and book were different. Which story line did they like best.
5. **Read to younger siblings.** Encourage your older child to read and discuss a book to a younger sibling or family member.
6. **Play Games.** Games like Scrabble, Boggle, and other board games require reading skills.

Supporting Your Child Through Middle & High School Math

3. Do admit if you don't fully understand a problem and it's ok if they don't understand it right now. Discuss how to figure out how to solve the problem, look at past problems, search on google or youtube.
4. Keep current on the math concepts being taught and research before hand to refresh your memory or learn a new the new concept before helping your child.
5. Look at your options—is there someone close like, uncle, neighbor, sibling that would be willing to help with math homework.
6. Be Cautious walking the fine line of helping, guiding, teaching and doing too much.

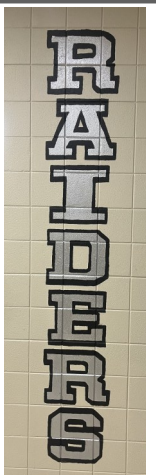
Career Readiness
