On December 13, 2019, South Gallia Middle School C.H.O.I.C.E.S. program traveled to Ashland, Kentucky to watch Tchaikovsky's Moscow 's Great Russian Nutcracker at the Paramount Arts Center. The ballet is a Christmas story about Uncle Drosselmeyer preparing his gift of life-sized Moore dolls for his niece Masha and nephew Fritz. One feature unique to the ballet were the tall innovative rolling backgrounds which were inspired by Eisenstein's cinematic technique. Tchaikovsky's music set the mood for each act from fanciful mood for a Christmas party, to the conflict between the Rat King and Nutcracker, to peace and harmony when Masha wakes up from her bad dream. The ballet was performed by professional dancers as



well as local talent. The Paramount Arts Center was built in 1931 and is on the National Register of Historic Places. The focus of the art center is on educational opportunities for youth. Before the ballet students enjoy eating at Fat Patty's.

Remote Control Vehicle Club Activity

C.H.O.I.C.E.S. program is offering the students a new hands-on remote control vehicle activity. The vehicles that students have to choose from are SWAT, SUVs, RC cars, Rally rock climbers, and off-road jeeps. Students are learning how to control the vehicle's movements by going around cones and corners, maneuvering obstacles courses built by the students using material that they bring in including ramps, jumps and ponds and racing competitors.

Parents were invited to the school in the evening to see the projects, watch the students receive their awards, and participate in the Energy Fair. Stations were set up that focused on different types of renewable energy. Middle school students were in charge of the stations to instruct students, teachers, and parents on the energy for that station. They, also, guided the participants in an activity that focused on that particular energy. Everyone enjoyed the evening and walked away with an increased knowledge of renewable energy.

They took the ornaments back to Huntington to fire them in the kiln and returned them in time for the students to take them home to hang on their trees.
