## No Kidding Ohio: Straight Talk from Teen Parents

Gallia County recently received an Economic Mobility and Responsible Parenting grant called No Kidding Ohio: Straight Talk from Teen Parents. The curriculum uses young parents as “peer educators” in the classroom to discuss the legal, financial, and emotional realities of being a teen parent. Students will be encouraged to delay parenting until they have followed the “success sequence” of completing an education, starting a career, and being in a committed relationship to help ensure they are financially and emotionally ready when they become a parent. The importance of fatherhood as well as understanding what a healthy relationship looks like was included in the presentation. The curriculum will have 3 interactive sessions: Telling Our Stories where peer educators share their personal stories and the realities of being a young parent. The second session was Understanding Paternity that covered the ways to establish paternity and the important role a father plays in the life of a child. The last session was Child Support and Money Matters in which students learned what the child support office does and how much it costs to raise a child. Students that attended all 3 sessions received a \$25.00 Walmart gift card.



## Foreign Exchanged Student Presentation

South Gallia High School has several foreign exchange students that attend their school. Lusine Jhangiryan from Armenia, presented to the S.T.E.P.S. program information about her country. Armenia is a former Soviet Republic nation in the mountainous region between of Asia and Europe. This small nation is divided into 8 regions, 23 counties, and 79 municipalities with a population of 3 million people. Armenia’s religion is predominantly a Christianity. Lusine shared with the students what it is like living in Armenia. She played some music and sang a song to the students. Through her eyes and words, students were able to understand the culture of Armenia a little bit better.



## Driver Education

S.T.E.P.S. offered Driver’s Education the second semester of the program. Parents of students that were 15 1/2 of age or older, to attend a meeting on Jan.5th or Jan. 6th to see the benefits of taking Drivers Ed through the afterschool program. If students are a member of S.T.E.P.S., students may take the book portion free of charge during the afterschool program. If a student attends the afterschool program for 30 days, the S.T.E.P.S. Program will pay for the driving portion also. By using the afterschool program, students can save their parents close to over \$300.00 and be prepared to get their license.
