4 Active Reading Strategies


Below you will find 4 strategies to increase your child's Reading comprehension.

Reading with a Purpose: Set a specific goal before reading such as finding certain information, understanding key concepts, or finding answers to certain questions.

Make Use of Visualization: Use a pencil, highlighter, or make notes or drawings in the margins to mark or note important things you encounter while reading.

Make or Note Important Things: Use a pencil, highlighter, or make notes in the margins to mark or note important things you encounter while reading. Using the SQ3R Technique: SQ3R stands for Survey, Question, Read, Recite, and Review. These steps include quickly examining the text to get a general idea, setting questions about what you want to learn, reading carefully, reviewing the information you have read, and reviewing to ensure deep understanding.

Using these strategies will strengthen your child's reading comprehension. With practice, these skills will become second while reading with comprehension increasing.



Not only does Math cover a huge range of skills, but it's also one of the few sub-5x².6y³.-1 Math a+b f(x)-f(x_o) jects where a strong understanding of the fundamentals is essential for future learning. No matter what

your background history with Math, you can still help your child to improve their skills. So it's time to ditch the Math stress and tackle the Math they need together so your child can succeed. Below are some strategies that you can incorporate at home to help with math.

Maintain a positive attitude and be encouraging: Be encouraging and build their confidence in Math. Math is a skill that takes practice. If it's confusing, this just means you don't understand it yet. In time, they can grow into Math understanding. Encourage your child to take advanced math courses and explore math-related careers. Practice and refine math vocabulary: Include math terms in conversations when Math situations are present. Using vocabulary can help your child to be more comfortable with Math and an insight of understanding some

math in everyday life: Help your child understand the relevance of math in real life by discussing news articles or career paths that use math.

Provide support: Attend parent-teacher conferences to stay informed about your child's progress and provide support as needed. Provide support for standardized tests, such as the ACT or SAT, which include a math section.

Building a positive attitude, confidence, and practice, students will become successful in their journey through the Math world.

The Pottery Place

On November 18th, the Pottery Place from Huntington, WV. visited the CHOICES & STEPS program bringing Christmas pottery pieces for the students to decorate. The students had a variety to choose from such as a Christmas Tree, to Gingerbread Man, Santa, and a Snowman. Pottery Place provides brushes and the paints for

the students to create their master piece. After the students completed decorating their pottery piece and adding their personal touches to make their unique piece the Pottery Place took them to their shop to fire them in the kiln and returned them to the children in time to for Christmas.





The **STEPS** program offers Drivers Education book work during their program for students that are 15 years and 6 months of age. The students can complete this book work in during the program and will receive a certificate required to take their drivers test. During a parent

meeting for all parents that have a student ready to start their driving course, it is explained that after the student attends 30 days of the afterschool program then their driving portion will be paid for also. Parents will save several hundreds of dollars through STEPS. Students learn a valuable skill that is important in the future by being able to get to a job site on their own, one more step to becoming a responsible and independent adult.

History Research Day

November 3, 2024, Bossard Library partnered with the STEPS & CHOIC-ES programs to host a History Research Day. This event was an opportunity for students to prepare for their Ohio History Day competition on March 1, 2025. Mr. Tribe, History professor at the University of Rio Grande, Randall Fulks, Bossard Library's reference services manager, and Grace Cremeens, a former Ohio History Day participant that placed nationally in the competition. Students were able to narrow broad topics down, locate reference material to check out and have deep discussions on the topics being investigated.





On October 29, 2024, CHOICES and STEPS held a family engagement called The Ghost Walk. This event provided the families with a guided tour to hear past spooky stories that originated in Gallia County. Registering at The Ariel, the tour started in The Ariel, then 5 stations in the park, to The Our House and finished up at the French Art Colony. Actors dressed for the time period and told their story from Gallia County at their station. At the French Art Colony families met Jannette Quackenbush, an author of Ohio Ghost Hunter Guide II Ghost Stories, Haunted **Hikes** and received a signed copy of the book which featured many stories from Gallia County and Hocking Hills. Health Recovery Services and Gallia Literacy Initiative handed out prizes and books to the families. Families received games and other items when they finished a survey.











The Cemetery Walk

On October 5, 2024, the Afterschool program partnered with Bossard Memorial Library to host a Cemetery Walk in the Pine Street Cemetery. Many reenactors took on the personalities of prominent Gallipolis citizens that came to rest in the cemetery. The reenactors were at their place of rest and told their story about living in Gallipolis as people visited their grave. Families received

Fall cookies, pens, notebook, and a book on how to research Family History using grave yards.
