



Building Literacy Skills at Home

Literacy based activities should be encouraged at home during middle and high school years. Below are a few strategies you can do at home with you middle and high schooler.

1. **Start a Family Book Club.** Read a book as a family and engage in discussions around the story.

3. **Promote Choice.** Allowing your child to choose books they want to read can help foster a love of reading.
4. **Mix in Movies.** Suggest books from movies your child likes. They may enjoy getting the additional details that the book provides. Discuss how the book and movie are different. Compare how the movie and book were different. Which story line did they like best.
5. **Read to younger siblings.** Encourage your older child to read and discuss a book to a younger sibling or family member.
6. **Play Games.** Games like Scrabble, Boggle, and other board games require reading skills.

5. Look at your options—is there someone close like, uncle, neighbor, sibling that would be willing to help with math homework.
