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4 Active Reading Strategies

Below you will find 4 strategies to increase your child's Reading comprehension.

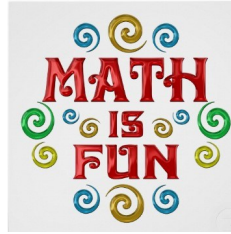
Reading with a Purpose: Set a specific goal before reading such as finding certain information, understanding key concepts, or finding answers to certain questions.

Make Use of Visualization: Use a pencil, highlighter, or make notes or drawings in the margins to mark or note important things you encounter while reading.

Make or Note Important Things: Use a pencil, highlighter, or make notes in the margins to mark or note important things you encounter while reading.

Using the SQ3R Technique: SQ3R stands for Survey, Question, Read, Recite, and Review. These steps include quickly examining the text to get a general idea, setting questions about what you want to learn, reading carefully, reviewing the information you have read, and reviewing to ensure deep understanding.

Using these strategies will strengthen your child's reading comprehension. With practice, these skills will become second while reading with comprehension increasing.



Not only does Math cover a huge range of skills, but it's also one of the few subjects where a strong understanding of the fundamentals is essential for future learning. No matter what your background history with Math, you can still help your child to improve their skills. So it's time to ditch the Math stress and tackle the Math they need together so your child can succeed. Below are some strategies that you can incorporate at home

Maintain a positive attitude: Be encouraging and build their confidence in Math. Math is a skill that takes practice. If it's confusing, this just means you don't understand it yet. In time, they can grow into Math understanding.

Practice and refine math vocabulary: Include math terms in conversations when Math situations are present. Using vocabulary can help your child to be more comfortable with Math and an insight of understanding some concepts.

Show math in everyday life: Math is everywhere. When these Math moments present themselves in every day life (baking, shopping, playing games, etc) share them with your child. Involve them in these moments.

Try game-based learning: Kids love games, board or video, because they are fun and exciting. Game based learning games can take the stress out of Math instruction and provide practice with the right mix of familiar and challenging skills.

Building a positive attitude, confidence, and practice, students will become successful in their journey through the Math world.

ARCHERY

Eric Clary with the Conservation Club instructs an Archery Activity with the Highlanders. He provides the necessary equipment, instruction, and supervised target practice. The students learn correct posture and stance, how to hold the bow correctly, and the proper release of the arrow. Students learn which eye is dominant to sight with and use this knowledge to set their sights on the target. Students are able to practice shooting at the targets. The culminating activity of Archery, the students participate in a friendly competition. Students love this activity and the challenge of hitting the bullseye.



Healthy Snacks

Tina Elkins, OSU SnapEd program, been leading an activity in the Highlanders Afterschool Program called Healthy Snacks. Students learn how to become more health conscience when choosing snacks, foods from a menu, and cooking. They work on reading labels and deciphering what is healthy and unhealthy, reading recipes, and using some kitchen tools safely. Mrs. Elkins works with the children with different recipes teaching how to substitute healthier ingredients for unhealthy ingredients. Students then follow the directions and prepare the snack. Leaving the best for last, they get to eat the healthy snack. As a culminating event for this activity, students invite their parents to their and share what they have learned. Students prepare snacks and serve them to their parents.



Painting Pumpkins

The children really enjoy this activity and being able to take them home to help decorate their home for the season.



Pottery Place Visit

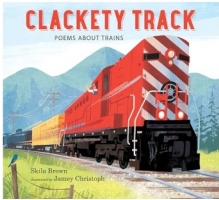
