One of the most important things parents can do with their children is to read aloud with them. By reading aloud with your children it can expand their vocabulary, and develop early literacy skills, such as rhyming and letter recognition. Another skill important for children to learn early on is comprehension using inference, text structure, beginning, middle, and end, predicting, and understanding characters' actions and motivations. By reading different kinds of books such as fiction, poetry, fantasy, science fiction, and nonfiction, gives the students a better understanding of the world around them and can expand the knowledge of different cultures, chance to see someone like them, see heroes, and contributes to their self-esteem.
